

## How to set goals and guidelines

Every squad will be different but it's a good idea to set some guidelines for how your squad will run.

Some things to think about:

### When, where and how often will you meet?

Meeting at the same place and time, on a regular day, can help everyone remember to turn up. If you set up a schedule, members can plan around meetings or let the squad know if they have a clash. You also may decide to meet more often when you're planning a big event or less often at exam time.

### Will you have assigned roles?

If your squad is small you may not need to assign individual roles but, if you have a big squad, or you're planning a big event, you may want to elect people to some key roles.

### How often will you organise an activity or event?

Netsafe recommends squads have at least one event a term. This could be something small like designing a poster or running a form-time quiz, or it could be something big like organising a discussion group or hosting an assembly. It's a good idea to talk about what other responsibilities squad members have at different times of the year so no one feels stressed out or over committed.

### What are your main goals?

Consider setting some short-term goals for each term and some long-term goals for the year. This way you can check in and see if you're achieving what you set out to do. Discussing goals is also a way of finding out what different members see as important and means everyone gets heard.
